Good Shepherd Celebration Learning to Serve 4 May 2012

'Proud of You' were some of the words used by Bishop Arthur Roche when children from 50 of the Diocesan Schools gathered to present to the Bishop the money they had collected over Lent for Catholic Care.



Roddy Minogue, Co-ordinator of Caring Services, welcomed the Bishop to the service along with everyone else who were to play a part in the mornings proceeding and thanked all those who had given their time effort and money in the raising of money for the Good Shepherd collection.

The liturgy was prepared and presented by pupils and staff of St Philip's Catholic Primary and Nursery School, Middleton, Leeds. They told us "When we are at school, we learn many things. One very important part of being at a Catholic school is learning how to serve others, just like Jesus did. This is what all of us here having been trying to do during Lent by raising money for the Good Shepherd Fund. Serving others is a privilege. During our Liturgy today, we want to think and pray about this very important part of our Catholic faith."

Having received the cheques from all the school the Bishop announced that the total handed to him on the Day was £40,000 - yet again more than the year before. In his homily, which followed the Bishop thanked them for being so generous and said that this is what made him proud of them - that they were doing it for others who did not have as much as them. He then went on to ask them to think up even more ways of raising more money next year as it will be 150 years since Catholic Care has been set up in the Diocese. Though the Bishop had a very busy day ahead of him after the service was over he remained in the Cathedral to have his picture taken with as many groups as wanted to be photographed with him.

"May the road rise up to meet you, may the wind be ever at your back. May the sun shine warm upon your face and the rain fall softly on your fields. And until we meet again, May God hold you in the palm of his hand."

Huddersfield Deanery ProjectWorking With Older People



Ashbrow councillor Ken Smith and ex Kirklees Mayor David Wright presented the Huddersfield Deanery Project for Older People with a cheque for £20,000 on Wednesday 25th April. Receiving the cheque were Adrian Abel, Project Chair and Joann Wareham, Project Manager. The money has been donated by Wakefield and District Health and Community Support Ltd and is to enable the Deanery Project to continue its work with older people in the area.

Cllr Smith said "This is a splendid community project which rose from the good people of Bradley, where it is still based, and a fine example of the community helping itself. It has created many opportunities for older people, including luncheon clubs, walking groups, craft groups and keep fit activities the totality of which helps older people both emotionally and physically. The Wakefield charitable trust is very pleased to encourage the organisation, which has 60 local volunteers, in continuing to provide services to this growing valued part of our community."

Around 140 people benefit from the Project's weekly activities. There are now some vacancies especially for 'Thursday Friends', a luncheon club in Brackenhall, which is moving from the Community Centre to the brand new and larger Northfield Hall that has been funded by the Deighton & Brackenhall Initiative. Regrettably, the economic climate has necessitated some redundancies and cuts in paid staff hours. However, Adrian Abel commented "This has been done without reducing the Project's range of events. Indeed there are plans to initiate some new events, made possible partly by the new donation. Nevertheless, more volunteers are urgently sought to ensure the whole Project has long term sustainable. The Project appreciates the efforts CIIr Smith in securing this donation."

"Mrs Jones, you haven't seen the room ... just wait."

"That doesn't have anything to do with it," she replied.

"Happiness is something you decide on ahead of time. Whether I like my room or not doesn't depend on how the furniture is arranged. It's how I arrange my mind. I already decided to love it. It's a decision I make every morning when I wake up. I have a choice. I can spend the day in bed recounting the difficulty I have with the parts of my body that no longer work, or get out of bed and be thankful for the ones that do. Each day is a gift, and as long as my eyes open, I'll focus on the new day and all the happy memories I have stored away just for this time in my life.

Old age is like a bank account. You withdraw from what you've put in. So, my advice to you would be to deposit a lot of happiness in the bank account of memories. And thank you for your part in filling my memory bank. I am still depositing."
